The Health Education Awareness Campaign is a crucial, interdisciplinary initiative led collaboratively by the University Medical Clinic, College of Allied Health Sciences, and Student Affairs and Services Center. This coordinated effort provides the university community with essential knowledge, tools, and preventative strategies regarding STIs, HIV, responsible sexual health, and legal compliance. This commitment ensures that vital, non-discriminatory health information is accessible to all students and employees.

The program successfully integrates experiential learning and interdisciplinary education through a series of highimpact seminars and talks. These include the STI Prevention Seminar, Sex Education Talk, and Anti-Sexual Harassment and Safe Spaces Act Seminar. These interventions equip students with practical, life-saving knowledge,



foster ethical understanding, and reinforce mental well-being while emphasizing personal responsibility and safety within a shared community.

The measurable engagement demonstrates the program's reach:

- STI Prevention Seminar: 400 students attended, with 300 condoms distributed following proper counseling.
- Sex Education Talk: 382 attendees gained interdisciplinary knowledge on sexual health and mental wellness.
- Safe Spaces Act Seminar: 231 students attended, promoting awareness of legal rights and fostering a safe learning environment.

To ensure access and equity, contraceptive materials were made available to students and employees following proper counseling, effectively extending preventive care beyond the classroom. The University reinforces this outreach with a commitment to research-informed programming, citing three (3) published studies aligned with SDG 3. This evidence base enhances UV's understanding of preventive health mechanisms and their optimal impact on student life.

The campaign reinforces trust and sustainability by institutionalizing the routine scheduling of these critical seminars across different units of the university. This sustained programming cultivates a long-term culture of safety, respect, and legal compliance within the University community. Through these coordinated, measurable efforts, UV establishes itself as an active leader in preventive health education, student empowerment, and community well-being.


STI PREVENTION SEMINAR

Brief Narrative

The University of the Visayas, through its Medical Clinic, successfully implemented its Medical Services Program with a focused initiative on strengthening health awareness among its academic community. One of the major activities carried out was the STI Awareness Seminar, designed to equip both students and employees with essential knowledge about Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) and Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). The seminar emphasized the importance of understanding modes of transmission, recognizing early signs and symptoms, and seeking timely and appropriate medical intervention. It also promoted responsible sexual behavior as a key component in preventing infection and maintaining overall reproductive health. The activity was facilitated by the clinic's physician and nurse, who provided a comprehensive and evidence-based discussion that encouraged participants to become proactive in safeguarding their wellbeing. Complementing the seminar, the Medical Clinic also made contraceptive materials, particularly condoms, available for distribution to both students and employees following proper counseling. This initiative aimed to reinforce the principles of safe and responsible sexual practices. In 2024 alone, a total of 300 condoms were distributed as part of the health education efforts for nursing students. Overall, the STI Awareness Seminar benefited around 400 students, contributing to the university's commitment to promoting a healthy, informed, and empowered campus community.


CONDOMS AVAILABLE AT THE UNIVERSITY MEDICAL CLINIC






I. RATIONALE

This seminar organized by the Student Affairs and Services Center aims to educate students at the University of Visayas about the Anti-Sexual Harassment and Safe Spaces Act. Its primary goal is to safeguard students' well-being by preventing and addressing instances of sexual harassment within the university community.

By raising awareness about the law and students' rights and responsibilities, the seminar ensures legal compliance and empowers students to recognize and respond to sexual harassment effectively.
