UV Degree Programs: Advancing SDGs Across Academic Courses

The University of the Visayas (UV) offers a diverse range of degree programs that actively advance the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by embedding sustainability, innovation, and social responsibility across all fields of study. Guided by its commitment to Quality Education (SDG 4), UV ensures that students are not only academically prepared but are also equipped with the competencies needed to address real-world challenges and contribute meaningfully to national and global development. For AY 2024–2025, a total of **10,219 students** directly benefited from sustainability-oriented programs and SDG-aligned courses, reflecting the university's broad institutional reach and impact.

Programs in nursing, biology, psychology, and public health directly support Good Health and Well-Being (SDG 3), while engineering, technology, architecture, and maritime education enhance national capacity for Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure (SDG 9). Business, law, and governance programs cultivate ethical leaders who advance Decent Work and Economic Growth (SDG 8) and promote Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions (SDG 16). Environmental science, climate-related studies, and community extension initiatives further contribute to Sustainable Cities (SDG 11) and Climate Action (SDG 13).

Aligned with SDG Target 17.9, UV strengthens domestic capacity-building through service-learning, applied research, and technical training embedded in the curriculum. Students collaborate with partner communities, local government units, national agencies, and industry professionals to co-create solutions, transfer knowledge, and upgrade local capacities in health, governance, environmental sustainability, and livelihood development—transforming academic learning into meaningful community empowerment.

Consistent with SDG Target 17.E, UV enhances access to technology and innovation by integrating ICT proficiency, data privacy, cybersecurity, engineering technology, and maritime systems into its academic programs. Through partnerships with government institutions, research centers, and private-sector organizations, the University promotes knowledge exchange, technological cooperation, and the adoption of global best practices that elevate both institutional and community capacity for sustainable development.

Guided by its vision-mission to develop globally competent and socially responsible professionals, the University of the Visayas positions education as a powerful engine for nation-building, inclusive growth, and sustainable societal transformation. Through its sustained alignment with the SDGs—particularly Targets 17.9 and 17.E—UV ensures that its academic programs remain responsive to national priorities and global development trends.

The previous school year 2023-2024 for UV had its usual Orientation programs, Acquaintance parties, Intramurals and Christmas parties, but what makes the last school year special was that it coincided with the 105th Founding Anniversary of UV especially the birthday of Don Vicente "Daddy Vic" Gullas. There was a Eucharistic celebration at the UV Chapel followed by a barrio fiesta and Alumni Homecoming Fellowship Night last January 13, 2024 at the Waterfront Hotel, Lahug, Cebu City. Outstanding Alumni in the different fields were recognized and awarded for their accomplishments.

As part of tradition, UV sponsored the 5:30 pm Mass at the Basilica Pilgrim Center last January 16, 2024 in preparation for the Feast of Sto. Nino de Cebu. Last January 22, 2024, we met with Mr. Ed Uyfang regarding the possibility of putting up a satellite or extension campus in Mantalongon, Dalaguete. There was a Eucharistic celebration last March 13, 2024, to commemorate the birthday of lady Josefina "Inday Pining" Gullas at the UV Chapel. A short program followed at the UV entrance where I shared to the audience my memories of "Mama Pining." The UV Alumni Association 2024 had its Induction Ceremonies last April 4, 2024 at the Casino Espanol where Dr. Salustiano T. Jimenez of DepEd was inducted as Alumni Association President with his board of directors.

Last May 21, 2024, we had our UV Quality Awards Day where Dr. Conrado E. Inigo Jr., our University President informed the audience that UV was ranked #6 among the top 10 universities in Cebu 2024 by EduRank. UV was also accredited ISO for this year. Dr. Inigo showed a list of foreign countries where we have educational linkages which can help us rank higher among other Philippine universities.

Last July 1, 2024, we met with Dalaguete Mayor Cesante and his municipal council to inform of our intention to continue our Dalaguete satellite campus for the next 4 years. Last August 9, 2024, we had our UV Employees Appreciation Day at the Mactan Newtown beachfront. Last September 5, 2024 we had a Mass of the Holy Spirit at the UV Gym at 9 am followed by the blessing of the New Executive Board offices. This report to our esteemed stakeholders covers Academic Year 2023-2024. It summarizes the major accomplishments and achievements of the University of the Visayas. This past academic year, we faced numerous challenges and opportunities that unwantedly tested our strength, resilience and adaptability. Through open communication, deep involvement in operations and having a strategic foresight, our senior leaders guided the organization with integrity and purpose, ensuring that we don't only navigated these changes but emerged stronger and more united. Our pursuit of excellence for the year under review yielded major accomplishments. We received several recognitions from the Commission on Higher Education, in particular the award as an AUTONOMOUS STATUS. UV was also certified as a deputized higher education institute under the Expanded Tertiary Education Equivalency and Accreditation Program (ETEEAP) for, Business Administration, Engineering, Architecture, Education, Criminology, and Office Administration.

In April 29-30, 2024, UV was recertified for its Quality Management System by TUV NORD with the award of ISO 9001:2015 certification. The University has made significant milestones in complying with accreditation standards, reflecting its commitment to provide quality education. Our continuous quest for accreditation during the year under review has yielded several results: namely: UV made substantial progress in accreditation, with five undergraduate programs achieving Level 4 accreditation status, and 14 graduate and undergraduate programs are now accredited. Likewise, the Student Records and Management Department enhanced its processes to ensure efficient graduation procedures and release of transcript of academic records during the Commencement Exercises. Student Affairs and Services Center initiated numerous programs addressing mental health, leadership and social responsibility. Program accreditation, the deployment of Quality Assurance Review and Planning, compliance with regulatory requirements, infrastructure investments and alignment to 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals are all in-placed in order to contribute with the UN 2030 goals.

Research is the primary mission of the university. Our research has produced several outputs including research grants from CHED while several researches were published in journals. There were several faculty members who presented papers in various conferences and research locally and internationally. The Intellectual Property Office of the Philippines awarded UV Bronze Award for its Intellectual Property initiatives.

Quality teaching and learning includes compliance with the required minimum academic qualifications of faculty members, meeting the expected performance evaluation, membership of professional organizations, advisership tasks, faculty ranking, curriculum validation and evaluation, board examination performances, external certification, National Certification program, Quality Circles, International English Language Certification, learning management system implementation as well as employability. In the context of our vision statement, our commitment to internationalization enhances our academic environment and enriches the student experience. Through strategic partnerships with international universities, and diverse cultural initiatives, we are fostering a global perspective among our students and other stakeholders. This initiative not only prepares our graduates to thrive in an interconnected world but also strengthens our university's position as a leader in global education. To date, there are 215 international students coming from 21 countries who are enrolled in the various undergraduate and graduate programs in the university. There is a slight increase in the number of enrolled international students compared to AY 2022-2023.

Likewise, embracing internationalization signifies the alignment of our learning outcomes in the curriculum as required by the industries. One is the adoption of the International English Language Certification by both students, faculty members and non-teaching personnel. By passing such and by attaining a certain level, they are now globally ready to work in another country. Semester-by-semester, UV produces passers of TOEIC examination.

The university has considered the importance of industry linkages, which enhance our academic programs and provide students with real-world experience. By collaborating with local businesses and organizations, we ensure our curriculum remains relevant and aligned with industry needs, ultimately preparing our graduates for successful careers. The university has local and global partnerships, through MOU/MOA signing in order to strengthen its link to the industry.

For relevance and responsiveness, we have continued to provide training and extension services to our adopted community. Our commitment to community involvement, highlighting initiatives that foster collaboration and support local needs. There are 23 community extension activities being conducted in 2023 to the adopted community and not to mention other outreach projects being carried-out. This engagement not only enriches our students' experiences but also reflects our dedication to social responsibility. Looking forward, we continue to touch base with our adopted community so UV can do a lot more. Our commitment to save the environment has taken another step with the implementation of the University Green Productivity Program though the deployment of the 5 S program.

The Quality Management System continues to be applied in day-to-day operations through various feedback mechanisms such as the Quality Circles, Best Innovative Procedures Award (BIPA), customer feedback mechanism, 5S and the Knowledge Based Management System. We continue to enhance our various ISO manuals by documenting procedures and policies for the guidance of all concerned.

There was a remarkable increase in our freshman enrollment for AY 2023-2024 compared to AY 2022-2023 for various programs. Total enrollment also went up this year compared to last year. Te increase in the enrollment can also be attributed to the preparation of roadmaps of the different colleges, thus the submission of the marketing plans. The creativity and strategic mindset of our senior leaders demonstrate our collective commitment to enhancing UV's visibility and outreach in our existing market. These marketing plans played a crucial role in attracting prospective students, retaining existing students and showcasing the unique offerings of UV.

Among the competency programs being offered in UV are: Housekeeping NC II, Food and Beverage Services NC II and Bread and Pastry Production NC II, all with validity up to 2029. Moreover, UV was able to receive the Certificate of Accreditation as a Competency Assessment Center for the following programs: Shielded Metal Arc Welding (SMAW) NC I, Shielded Metal Arc Welding (SMAW) NC II, Food and Beverage NC II, Tourism Promotion Services NC II, Bread and Pastry Production NC II, Housekeeping NC II, Bookkeeping NC III, Travel Services NC II and Cookery NC II, all with validity up to 2025.

UV continued to excel in academics and student competitions. The school has sent teams to various competitions in regional and national curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular, athletic and artistic competitions and has brought home a significant number of championships and top three places.

Learning management system was implemented coupled with other innovative instructional styles were introduced to enrich the curriculum delivery. These are quite critical as innovative teaching is a function of effective learning. These initiatives resulted to one board examination topnotcher from the College of Education and a placer in the regional board examination as administered by the Board of Criminology. In Academic Year (AY) 2023-2024, the University of the Visayas (UV) continued to solidify its commitment to academic excellence, student development, and community engagement. By emphasizing a holistic education and fostering social responsibility, UV enhanced its regional influence through notable academic performance, strategic partnerships, and a growing focus on research. These achievements, paired with progress in accreditation and program expansion, set the stage for future advancements.

One key success was UV's performance in professional licensure examinations. The Bachelor of Science in Criminology program achieved a 100% passing rate in July 2024, positioning UV among the top schools in Region 7. Across the Colon Campus, 46% of programs, including Criminology, Nursing, Education, Pharmacy, and Accountancy, exceeded national passing rates. Toledo and Dalaguete campuses also exceeded expectations, with Dalaguete earning recognition as a top-performing school for its Bachelor of Elementary Education program in the country. The institution made substantial progress in accreditation, with five undergraduate programs achieving PACUCOA Level 4 status and all 14 graduate programs now accredited. Furthermore, the Student Records and Management Department enhanced its processes to ensure efficient graduation procedures and release of records during graduation while the Student Affairs and Services Center (SASC) spearheaded numerous programs addressing mental health, leadership, and social responsibility.

UV's commitment to research was evident, with 90% of colleges launching academic journals, many earning ISSN accreditation. The Intellectual Property Office of the Philippines (IPOPHIL) awarded UV a Bronze Award for its intellectual property initiatives. The university's community engagement also flourished, with the Community Extension and Relations Office (ComRel) completing 72 extension activities that benefited 2,829 individuals. These initiatives were recognized in a recent ISO report, highlighting UV's community involvement as a model of best practice in higher education.

Looking ahead, UV remains focused on its goal of continuous improvement and expansion. Plans for the upcoming academic year include pursuing higher-level accreditations for both undergraduate and graduate programs, expanding international certification programs, integration of National Certifications to all programs. The introduction of Montessori education at the basic level and the development of new programs in emerging fields such as artificial intelligence is also part of UV's strategic plans. HISTURICAL BACKGRUUND



Vicente A. Gullas in 1919 as the Visayan Institute (V.I.) in Cebu City. The second World War razed to the ground the physical facilities of the V.I. at its original site. Undaunted by adversities, Don Vicente reopened classes in Argao, Cebu in 1946. A year later, the external campuses. Institute moved back to its present site along Colon corner D. Jakosalem Streets, Cebu City.

As early as its founding, the V.I. had pioneered in education innovations to provide equal education opportunities, especially for the poor but deserving students. It was the first school to 1940s. The "Study Now, Pay Later Plan" had been a practice at the V.I. positions in both private and government agencies. long before it was adopted by the Department of

For two decades up to 1940s, the Gullas couple shepherded the growth and development of the Visayas Institute starting from a secondary education and commerce. One salient feature of the school was its pioneering night classes for both high school and tertiary students, an educational strategy designed to widen access to education for working young men and women from middle class and lower middle class

In 1948, the Visayan Institute was awarded university status, the first to become a university in Cebu, and was renamed the University of the Visayas (UV). UV's university status, coupled with its generous scholarship policy for working students has made the school even today a well-acclaimed institution serving economically hard-up yet intellectually competent clientele.
